Slam Bidding

There is a large bonus for bidding and making Slam

In order to bid Slam you need a combined

- 33 + points for a **Small Slam** (12 tricks)
- 37 + points for a Grand Slam (all 13 tricks)

For example, if partner opens and you have 20 points, you should consider reaching slam. The requirements for Slam are an 8 + card fit if you intend playing in a suit, or a long minor suit if you intend playing in No Trumps

You also need to know the number of **Controls** (Aces and Kings) that the partnership holds as you don't want to be in a Small Slam missing an Ace and a King, or in a Grand Slam missing an Ace; hence we need to introduce a new **Convention** which asks for Aces and Kings. This convention is known as **Gerber**, and is activated by a jump to 4* - which asks partner to tell you how many Aces they hold

A subsequent bid of 5 ♣ can be used to ask for Kings

If Gerber is unavailable (for example if the bidding has gone 1 \bigstar – 4 \bigstar , and you have 19 points opposite your partner's 13, the convention known as **Blackwood** can be used. Here 4 NT acts as an Ace ask, and a subsequent bid of 5 NT acts as a King ask

The main problem with using Blackwood is that the responses are at a higher level of bidding
